California stands at a crossroads, facing two immense crises – one fiscal, the other economic. These dual crises have left California's families battered and state and local budgets ill-equipped to respond. As double-digit unemployment rates increase demands on the safety net, more Californians turn to publicly supported programs to help make ends meet.

There is a growing awareness that the constitutional framework imposed by decades of ballot measures has led to unintended consequences and makes it difficult to craft a fiscally responsible budget. While there are signs that the national economy may have turned the corner, California lags behind, facing the prospect of a recovery that will be weak and slow to arrive.

The budget and policy decisions that are made to address these crises will shape California's future for decades to come.

Can California be saved? What can policymakers do to address the budget shortfall and prepare for a future that promotes economic well-being for all Californians? Is this the year for "real" budget reform?

The California Budget Project's 2010 policy conference, *The Three Rs: Recession, Recovery, and Reform – What's in Store for California?*, will explore the answers to these questions and more.
