High-Concentration English Learners (EL) High Schools are those in which more than one-third of the students are English Learners. There are 89 such schools. These 89 High Concentration EL High Schools enroll 152,668 students, representing 9% of high school students in the state.

Please note that not all types of schools are included to calculate district student enrollment. We exclude the following schools: County Community Schools, Community Day Schools, California Youth Authority Schools (CYA), Juvenile Halls, and Opportunity Schools.

High-Concentration EL High Schools require more and specialized resources (teacher training, professional development, instructional materials, etc.) than other California schools. Yet California's high schools serving the highest proportion of English Learners are less likely than other California schools to have quality learning conditions in place.

¹ According to the California Department of Education, an English Learner (EL) is "a K-12 student who, based on objective assessment, has not developed listening, speaking, reading, and writing proficiencies in English sufficient for participation in the regular school program" (see http://www.cde.ca.gov/sp/el/er/). Students who are English Learners have the unique challenge of mastering both a new language and the content of the curriculum. To meet this challenge, EL students need specially trained teachers and appropriate assessment and learning materials in addition to all of the other educational resources all students need. Schools with high concentrations of English Learners are especially in need of these resources.

College Opportunity


Graduation rates are reported in many different ways. The College Opportunity Ratio (COR) is a 3-number figure that tells how many students graduate and how many pass the courses required for admission to CSU and UC compared to each 100 students enrolled as 9th graders four years before. For example a COR of 100:90:50 means that for every 100 9th graders, 90 graduated four years later and 50 passed courses required for admission to CSU and UC. We report the COR for all students and for African American, Latino, and American Indian students, who are underrepresented in California's colleges. For the class of 2007:


