



White Student Demographics


Elementary School Students


We encourage the reader to read these fact sheets in conjunction with the California Educational Opportunity Report.



White Student Demographics

- 27.3% of Elementary School Students are white.
- 28.8% of Middle School Students are white.
- 33.9% of High School Students are white.
- 22.1% of white students attend schools in which the majority of students are eligible for free and reduced price meals.
- 7.6% of white students attend schools in which 1/3 or more of students are English Language Learners.
- 11% of white students attend Program Improvement (PI) schools.
- 15.6% of white students attend high schools designated overcrowded by the state.

Percentage of California Students Attending Schools where Majority are Eligible for Free and Reduced Price Meals




California White Students and Their Schools

White Student California School Enrollment

- Schools with qualified teacher shortages enroll 2.1% of all white students.
- Schools with college preparatory course shortages enroll 55.4% of all white high school students.

California White Students Class of 2007: Pathway to College

The chart above shows the progress of California's white students in the Class of 2007. All of the bars represent a percentage of the white 9th graders enrolled in fall 2003. The *10th*, *11th*, and *12th Grade* bars show that the size of the class shrinks each year. *Grads 2007* and *A-G Grads* show how many white students graduated and how many passed the A-G courses required for admission to a California State University or University of California campus. The final three bars show what proportion of the white 9th graders enrolled in a California Community College, California State University, or University of California campus in fall 2007.
